This program is one of two ways Marathon County residents can fulfill the horticulture education requirement to become a certified Master Gardener Volunteer. Residents unable to make the local program are encouraged to enroll in <u>Growing and Caring for Plants in Wisconsin:</u> <u>Foundations in Gardening</u>, Extension's statewide virtual gardening program.

Marathon County Master Gardener Volunteer horticulture classes are only available for those who intend to volunteer as Marathon County Master Gardeners in 2023 and beyond. Once the horticulture education requirement is complete, volunteers will need to complete the <u>Master</u> <u>Gardener Program Onboarding Course</u>.

Al Equipment and Heat Detection Aids

Reproductive Tracts, Semen Handling, and Practice with Cows

During this session, participants will work with reproductive tracts and practice handling and thawing semen and loading the insemination gun.

Practice with Cows

Students will be asked to demonstrate proper method of inseminating cows. Written Exam

Educational Credits


