

Greetings!

The dropping temperatures and <u>turning of colors</u> of leaves is a signal it's time to start preparing for winter. The maintenance work we put in now can help reduce disease and insect pressures next season.



Now is a good time to split spring blooming perennials, such as <u>bearded iris</u> and peonies. Consider <u>leaving the stems and leaves</u> of perennial plants that were not affected by foliar diseases. This helps our pollinator friends overwinter for next summer. If you have shallow rooted plants, such as heuchera (coral bells), you will want to provide a nice thick <u>winter mulch</u> to prevent them from heaving out of the ground.

Be sure to record in your <u>garden journal</u> any insect or disease issues in your vegetable gardens. While you're at it, record the placement of the vegetables in your garden. This will make <u>crop rotation</u> easier next year. Remove all plant material. Crop rotation and good sanitation will help reduce diseases and insect pests next year. You'll want to protect your soil over the winter, either with <u>cover crops</u> or mulch.

Trees and shrubs need <u>protection from rodents</u> as well as continued watering until the ground freezes. And don't forget to dig up those <u>tender</u> <u>bulbs</u>, like cannas, begonias, and dahlias. You can even <u>overwinter</u> <u>geraniums</u>.

Gardening is ripe with many lessons for life. Fall maintenance is one. If we put in the work now, our future selves will thank us next summer.
